

**MINUTES OF THE RIFLE AND PISTOL RANGE
BOARD OF MANAGEMENT MEETING
FEBRUARY 25, 2006**

Board members present: Freddy Haltom, Joe Basham, and Bill Cooke.

Club members present: Fran Compton

1. Freddy brought up the proposal to build an archery range directly south of the pistol bays. The project was discussed and approved. The archery range is only to be accessed for set up and running of an approved archery match. No access for any practice not connected to a Match date.
2. The discussion was continued that was brought up at the annual meeting on the possibility of accommodating Concealed Handgun License classes in the bullseye range. The board agreed that providing a place for CHL students to practice was a positive thing, but having CHL class use the bullseye range would infringe on the members showing favor to a profit making entity.
3. The range phone service was discussed. Joe Compton was given the go ahead to contract with another service provider and to block any long distance calls for the phone . The pay phone has been removed and an extension of the regular range phone will be installed on the outside of the clubhouse.
4. The range rules for range N were discussed again and the changes were as follows. Add the sighting in of rifle less than 25 yards and remove the restriction on clay bird targets.
5. The exception rules were discussed again with the decision to separate the match exceptions and put other range exceptions in the regular range rules.
6. The back gate repair and the stolen caliche were discussed to be researched and resolved in the near future.
7. A complaint was registered with the club President, Tony Dilley, which was passed on the to the Rifle Range Supervisor, Freddy Haltom, to be brought up and discussed at the next meeting. The complaint was verified by Freddy. Bill Slattery made an official complaint, that the toilet paper being used in the Rifle Range restrooms was of poor quality and that the club members deserved to have better. Bill said he liked the paper he had supplied better when he was on the board because it was better paper and it was individually wrapped. Bill declined the offer to present this complaint in person and refused the offer to volunteer to resume buying the paper products. The complaint was brought up at the meeting and samples of both toilet papers were examined. The newer paper was decided to be better than the previously used paper. The purchase of paper products falls on moderate quality, moderate price, and convenience of the person volunteering to purchase and pickup said products.
